

Raising Awareness of County Lines (Cross Border Gangs).



One Minute Guide



What's is County Lines?

'County lines' is the term used to describe the approach taken by gangs originating from large urban areas, who travel to locations elsewhere such as county or coastal towns to sell class A drugs. Gangs typically recruit and exploit children and vulnerable young people to courier drugs and cash. Typically, users ask for drugs via a mobile Females who have entered into relationships with gangs phone line used by the gang. Couriers travel between the gang's urban base and the county or coastal locations on a regular basis to collect cash and deliver drugs.

Involvement in County Lines

Gangs recruit children and young people through deception, intimidation, violence, debt bondage and/or grooming. This could be in the form of a 'runner' in the county location to make cash deposits into bank accounts registered to associates or family members of members in the urban location.

Despite gangs often consisting of larger groups, only a small number of members will be present in each county location at any given time, usually 2-4 individuals. Gang members could be rotated between county locations to try and evade detection. The presence of larger groups would usually be in response to conflict, as a show of strength.

County Line gang members are often associated to an urban street gang linked to their home borough. This additional affiliation can cause enhanced tensions amongst both males and females from Child Abuse/Sexual rival gangs in county locations and include violent incidents Exploitation should be a high priority within and county generated by feuds in the home borough.

develop a market. Gangs take over addresses of local vulnerable adults by force or coercion. In some cases social convey drugs in to, and supply them throughout the local housing accommodation has been targeted by the gangs who have identified vulnerable children and adults who could lead to personal drug use and in some cases could be reside in these properties.

Gangs are also known to utilise consenting adult females to Referral process assist criminal activity. The common form of assistance provided by females is allowing the use of their home address to running and holding drugs. It is important to think about the child who may reside in the property who will be affected and possibly involved as a runner. In

addition females are reported to be used to book hotels, hire cars and identify addresses for cuckooing. 'Cuckooing' is the term used to describe the practice where professional drug dealers take over the property of a vulnerable person and use it as a place from which to run their drugs business.

members are often controlled and subject to domestic abuse. In some cases females can be sexually assaulted or threatened with sexual assault and can be exploited for sex in payment for drugs.

Violence is used regularly in order to establish and maintain county lines, generally it is directed towards drug users who fail to pay their debts or individuals who are accused of stealing from the gang, such as runners.

Cars and rail networks are generally used by county line gangs. Gangs also continue to use taxis within county boundaries. Car rentals can also be used to avoid detection from law enforcement agencies.

Links to Child abuse and Sexual Exploitation

Children continue to be exploited by county line gangs. Although Child Abuse/Sexual Exploitation is not the driving factor in county lines gangs exploiting children, a clear link between county lines exploitation and Child Abuse/Sexual Exploitation exists. Appropriate measures for safeguarding line approaches.

Gangs must establish a base in the county location to The National Crime Agency (2017) report that there has been an increase of the use of local and urban children to county line markets. This poses many risks to children and linked to Child Sexual Exploitation.

If you believe that a child has been the victim of, or is at risk of Child abuse and or exploitation then you should also refer the child to the Children and Families Service.
